



Wright at Home opens doors to Hawthorn Hill

Over 400 history lovers joined Dayton History and the Oakwood Historical Society for the return Wright at Home - a tour of Hawthorn Hill and walking tour of the surrounding neighborhood on Sunday.

Hawthorn Hill never disappoints the beauty, grandeur, history, stories and anecdotes entertained all who attended. The tour commenced at the grand entrance to Hawthorn Hill with an overview and greeting by Alex Heckman of Dayton History that led to an intimate glimpse of the home and Orville Wright's life in Oakwood. This look-back into Oakwood in the early 1900s included a special presentation of old movie reels of the Wright family by Stephen Wright, the great-grandnephew of the Wright Brothers, as well as historical displays from the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Park and the Oakwood Historical Society. Refreshments included Orville's favorite Coconut Macaroon cookies and Dayton's own Cheez-it crackers.

A walking tour of Orville Wright's famous neighbors was led by the Oakwood Historical Society. Even the chilly temperatures did not deter the enthusiasm of the docents or guests as they learned about Joseph Green of Cheez-It Crackers, William Chryst of DELCO, Elmer Biechler from Frigidaire, Harry Schenck of Schenck and Williams Architects, and Charles Seybold of Seybold Machine Company.

Oakwood is rich in history, and Wright at Home is a great example of the innovation, creativity, vision and drive of the city's early residents.

OHS students face disciplinary action over racist, threatening social media posts

An undisclosed number of Oakwood High School students face disciplinary action after students reportedly posted a homemade music video featuring racist song lyrics that specifically referenced minority students in the school.

District officials declined to say how many students were disciplined in connection with the incident, or what punishments the students faced. which reportedly included suspensions and removal from athletic team(s).

"Oakwood Schools administrators are continuing to take action after being alerted to the existence of a series of social media posts created by Oakwood High School students in which racial slurs and threatening language were used," the district said in a statement shared with parents and

staff. "While the district is prevented from sharing information regarding any type of student discipline, be assured there are serious consequences for students engaging in this behavior. Oakwood Schools does not condone or permit racism, intolerance or discrimination in any form.

"We will respond to any expressions of racist or bigoted language with the appropriate and necessary

actions to correct them," the statement continued. "In addition to meeting with the students directly involved and their families, a class meeting was held with other students Friday, April 14, to reiterate the district's intolerance for racist language and impress upon them the importance of thinking before acting. This incident is evidence Oakwood Schools and the Oakwood community are

not immune to the issues currently plaguing our society.'

The statement sent to parents and staff also included links to four websites - hosted by the On Our Sleeves, The Movement for Children's Mental Health, the American Psychological Association, Kidshealth, and UNICEF - which address discussing racism with children.



'Round Town

Arigatou Gozaimasu

I was tempted to call this column: "If It's Tuesday, It Must Be Kyoto," (does anyone remember that filmic allusion?), but since I stayed a week in Handa, four days in Tokyo, and four more in Kyoto, plus stops in Tagasaki, Ikaho, Nara, Nagoya, Hiroshima, Miyajima, and Osaka, the Friendship Force journey did not seem like those European or cruise "whirlwinds" through numerous countries. The Japanese people could not have been more pleasant, bowing at everything (even the clerks at the airline counters bowed before they started checking us all in), and showering us with gifts. That's why I said "arigatou gozaimasu" so much. Thank you very much.

The first week was a homestay. First, the hosts welcomed us with a bento box lunch with some items many of us had never eaten. We introduced ourselves, and they intro-duced themselves: Jacqueline Bunke, Arti Chandra, Nancy and Roy Dyer, Bobi McDermott, Jane Rahn, Bambi and Jon Saxe, Warkoneta Tucker, Jan Vivanco from the U.S. and Mayu Ishigami, Noriko Kato, Harumi Yoshida, Yoko Doi, Toshio Sakakibara, Kumiko Ozeki, and Etsuko Sugie. The hosts drove us all over Aichi Prefecture. First, we went to Inuyama Castle, took a boat on the river, visited Karakuri Museum

with our host **Ryuzo Ando**. The next day we visited the Toyota Automobile Museum with a fabulous collection of old cars, rode the Maglev (magnetic levitation) train Linimo to Ghibli Park where the cartoon characters of Studio Ghibli are represented, and had a curry lunch. We also toured Tokoname, a pottery city known for its deep red color and unique designs since the 12th century.

After a farewell party with our hosts and the members of the Aichi Friendship Force club, we took the shinkansen (bullet train) to Tokyo to meet Chiz Marion, our guide for the next two weeks and a member of the Dayton Friendship Force. We began our tour of temples and shrines, both Buddhist and Shinto. We went up the Tokyo Tower, rode the yurika-mome (monorail), went to Takasaki, had lunch on the 21st floor of the city hall, toured Kannon-yama with its 33 statues in a long cave, and climbed up the 146 steps inside the Goddess of Mercy.

Another highlight was seeing the great Buddha at Kamakura with a height of 11.4 meters.

My favorite place was up in the mountains at Ikaho, a hot springs town. There are 13,000 onsens in Japan, and I tried every one of the 20 pools in Ikaho at the Hotel Kogure.

Then we went on to Kyoto, another

great city with a lot of historical shrines and temples. One was Fushimi Inari Taisya with its 10,000 tori (shrine gates) and 12,000 steps to the shrine. We walked the Path of Bamboo in a grove, Chikurin-no Komichi. In Nara we visited Yakushi-ji, Toshodai-ji, and Heijo Palace. (I learned that -ji at the end indicates a temple). We saw a geisha show in Gion and had our second tea ceremony.

Our next to last stop was Hiroshima (you know why we had to go there) and Miyajima, an island famous for its floating tori. We ended our tour in Osaka, visiting its castle and then flying from there back to the U.S. Chiz was aided in this great adventure by Bambi Saxe who also helped plan the tour. I met a lot of very nice people, many from other Friendship Force clubs all over Japan, and am sorry not to be able to list all of their names. Now my "bucket list" is shortened, and I think the west coast of Ireland ("The Loving Spouse" - who regretted not going to Japan - and I hitchhiked up the east coast back in the 70s) rises to the top. Where do you want to travel to widen your perspective?

Being in the Friendship Force we become citizen diplomats, promoting peace and friendship; that's why the stop in Hiroshima was so important. The walk through the Peace Park there was very emotional. Konbanwa.

Volunteers were at the heart of the Oakwood Schools Foundation when it was founded over 40 years ago - and the same remains true to this day.

Founded in 1981, the Oakwood Schools Foundation (OSF) was brought to life by a passionate group of volunteers who led the way, establishing a philanthropic organization for Oakwood Schools to support needs in education "beyond the reach of the School's normal operating budget" as explained in the organization's founding documents. Listed on the first Foundation ledger were the names of 21 volunteer community leaders, five Board of Education members and the superintendent of the time, Dr. Daniel Raisch. Much to Kevin Jones surprise, his late father, Robert K. Jones, was listed among the original founders.

A consummate community volunteer himself, Kevin Jones is a current Trustee of the Foundation, serving as its Vice Chair, while also providing additional volunteer leadership as the FLOURISH Campaign Chair. FLOURISH, a campaign for the performing and visual arts at Oakwood Schools is the largest campaign in the history of Oakwood. Upon seeing his father's name on the document, Jones immediately said, "Thanks, Dad."

He later said of the discovery, "I always felt very proud of my dad. I had no idea that he was one of the founding fathers back in the day and I was very excited to realize how closely I followed in his footsteps because the Foundation is so important to myself and to my family and our community."

"Like father like son," Amy Martin, Development Chair of the Foundation

stated. She felt goosebumps upon seeing the familiar name. Martin was not surprised by the common thread from father to son all these decades later. Kevin has been a dedicated member of the community since he was a boy growing up on the 200 block of Corona, the oldest of the Jones family's six siblings. Kevin went on to graduate from The Ohio State University and has been in the family insurance business for more than thirty years. Today, Kevin Jones leads the Robert K. Jones Insurance Agency in Kettering, the insurance agency founded by his father in 1972. He says going into the family busi-ness was a natural fit because, "I like to help people and insurance is a very people-oriented, relationship business'

Kevin often shows gratitude to his fellow volunteers and highlights the efforts of others. He has a particular fondness for telling the histories of those family and community members who came before us - those who built the foundation for the current Oakwood community. Jones credits his parents, Marianne and Bob Jones, for teaching him these values and providing a loving foundation for himself and his siblings as they grew up in Oakwood - values that continue to live on through him today.

Kevin suggested honoring his parent's legacy through a group gift from his brothers and sisters to the Flourish Campaign in honor of his loving parents. The gratitude he and his family feel for the upbringing provided by their parents and community is deep and heartfelt and have inspired them to celebrate the past and give to enrich future generations. Since leading this gift as a family, Kevin has shared this concept with other friends and family inspiring additional group family gifts along the way. These gifts will be memorialized throughout the campaign but also will live on in recognition, etched on the walls of the same Junior High and High School that he and his siblings walked not long ago.

Kevin Jones is often referred to as "the nicest guy in Oakwood" due to his focus on people and paying it forward. Kevin is a committed Oakwood Schools alum of the Class of 1982, has led various community organizations over the years in addition to running his family insurance agency, and still finds time to host gatherings for family and friends. Kevin resides in Pointe Oakwood and is an avid UD Flyers fan. He enjoys spending time with his life partner whom he calls his "better half," Kris O'Neill, and her three children and attending his many friends and family members' events and activities.



Collectible cars and artifacts ranging from 1899 to 1958 are on display in the original building of the 1917 Dayton Packard Dealership. One of Dayton's hidden gems, this Art Deco showroom has been restored to "a Palace Worthy of the Packard," says The New York Times, and is available for events from 50-250 people. The museum features over 50 automobiles on display in restored Art Deco showroom and includes the Army staff car - a 1942 Clipper - used by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the 1948 Packard Custom Victoria driven by Cate Blanchett in the Cincinnati-made movie Carol, and the 1903 Model K Grey Wolf, a racer finished fourth in the 1904 Vanderbilt Cup race

The Dayton Society of Natural History curates approximate 1.8 million objects and specimens across several disciplines. The Anthropology Collection is the largest (1.4 million items) and is dominated by archaeological specimens including those excavated from SunWatch Indian Village/Archaeological Park. Largely self-taught, he experimented with the expressive potential of woodblock printing, including the texture of the wood grain and effects from cutting and scratching the surface with knives and awls. He said, "I work to create painting without a brush, using the flat surface of the plate instead. The range of subjects in his work varies - from landscapes and architecture to the human figure and cats - but there is always an element of abstraction, with the patterns, colors and textures being as much the focus as what is depicted. Saito was associated with the sosaku-hanga ("creative prints") movement, which promoted the printmaker as sole creator, handling all stages of the process - designing, carving and printing. This resulted in highly individualized artworks. After winning a top prize at the 1951 São Paulo Biennale, he became a representative of the movement and helped popularize sosakuhanga internationally. His works were especially admired by Americans traveling to Japan in the postwar years, such as Virginia W. Kettering, who collected all the prints on view in the exhibition.



"After he retired in 1988, Davis Created the Willis Bing Davis Art Studio & EbonNia Gallery in Dayton and has continued to work on international projects in Russia, Bermuda, China, and Ghana in his free time." He is currently the President of the board of directors of the National Conference of Artists. Davis makes art from found objects and often includes mixed media. 





DPO string quarter presents afternoon of chamber music at the Dayton Art Institute

Dayton Performing Arts Alliance (DPAA) presents an intimate afternoon of chamber music featuring the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra's Principal String Quartet at 3 p.m. Sunday, April 29, at the Dayton Art Institute's Mimi and Stuart Rose Auditorium. The concert features Anton Webern's "Langsamer Satz (1905) for String Quartet," Sergei Prokofiev's "String Quartet," Sergei Prokofiev's "String Quartet No. 2 in F Major, Op. 92" and Benjamin Britten's "String Quartet No. 2 in C Major, Op. 36."

Dayton Philharmonic's Principal String Quartet showcases the talents of acting concertmaster Aurelian Oprea; principal violin Kirstin Greenlaw; principal viola Sheridan Currie; and principal cello John Kurokawa.

"It is a great pleasure for the four of us to rehearse and learn this all-20th-century program," said Oprea. "We don't usually have a chance to play chamber music during the season. So, rehearsing in such an intimate setting is very refreshing, especially after a few weeks spent in the pit of the Schuster Center playing large-scale works like 'Das Rheingold' and 'Peter Pan.'" The afternoon begins with Anton Webern's "Langsamer Satz (1905) for String Quartet." Inspired by a hike in the mountains outside of Vienna, Webern intended to compose a complete string quartet but set the piece aside after completing just one movement, the slow movement. Called a "little masterpiece" by some, "Langsamer Satz" explores a gamut of emotions from yearning and dramatic to tranquility.

Prokofiev's "String Quartet No. 2" was written at the request of a Soviet government official when Prokofiev and other Soviet artists were evacuated to Nalchik, 900 miles south of Moscow, to avoid the Nazi invasion in 1941. Written in three movements, Prokofiev chose Karabardino-Balkar folk themes evidenced by the quartet's imitation of Asian plucked and percussion instruments. "String Quartet No. 2 in F Major, Op. 92" premiered in Moscow in 1942 and was called "an extremely turbulent success."

Benjamin Britten composed his "String Quartet No. 2 in C Major" to commemorate the 250th anniversary of English composer Henry Purcell's death; it premiered on Nov. 21, 1945. Considered one of the most important string quartets of the 20th century, Britten's three-movement quartet nods to Purcell in the finale movement by using a specific kind of variation known as a chaconne which Purcell referred to as "chacony." A chacony consists of a theme and 21 variations divided into four sections by solo cadenzas by the violin, viola, and cello.

Tickets are on sale now at www. daytonperformingarts.org, by calling (937) 228-3630, or at the door before the concert. Adult tickets are \$25; student tickets are \$10.

Dayton's Flight Line Trail project receives funding

A project that would connect downtown Dayton to hundreds of miles of area bike trails has secured an additional \$1.5 million in funding.

The Flight Line Trail project will transform a 6.5-mile former rail corridor into a multi-purpose bike trail. U.S. Rep. Mike Turner helped secure the funding for the project. "By connecting the bike path with the rest of the system, it will attract activity, energy, and excitement," Turner said.

The City of Dayton will begin design and construction work later this year after concluding acquisition negotiations with Norfolk Southern. A further timeline for the project has not been announced.

The Schuster Center is located at 1 West Second St. in Dayton.



Lax Jacks finish long week with overtime victory

Nate Clark's goal in overtime lifted the Oakwood High School boys lacrosse team to an 8-7 victory over the Bishop Fenwick Falcons on Friday at Lane Stadium.

It was the second goal of the game for Clark, a senior defensive captain. The win put the Lumberjacks back on the winning track after suffering back-to-back narrow losses in their previous two games. It also halted a red-hot Falcons team that had not lost in a month and was riding a six-game winning streak. Oakwood, on the other hand, had experienced a challenging five-game stretch over seven days.

Clark's first goal of the game got the scoring started, putting the Jacks up 1-0. However, Fenwick scored the next two goals and led 2-1 after the first quarter.

Senior attack Max Parker scored on the Jacks' opening possession of the second quarter to tie the game at 2-2, but Fenwick managed to get a shot past Oakwood goalie Carter Stack to retake the lead, 3-2, two minutes later. Lumberjack goals by sophomore Ben Hick, Parker and senior Logan Maynor gave Oakwood a 5-3 lead midway through the quarter. But the Falcons added another goal to make the score 5-4 Oakwood at the end of the first half.

Both teams came out hitting hard in the second half, and the Lumberjacks were assessed a three-minute penalty for unnecessary roughness at the 10:15 mark of the quarter. The Falcons scored 45 seconds later to tie the game at 5-5. On Fenwick's next possession,

Oakwood was penalized for two separate infractions, putting the Jacks at a three-man disadvantage. Oakwood's three lone defenseman - seniors Jack Hick and Andrew LaFountain and junior Dominic Baker - were able to stop the six Falcon attackers from scoring and keep the game tied at 5-5.

Both teams continued the physical play throughout the quarter, yet neither team could manage to put a ball in the net until Oakwood's P.J. Bremner scored with 3:47 left in the fourth, giving the Jacks a 6-5 lead. Fenwick, however, scored on their next two possessions to go back in front 7-6 with just 1:32 to go in regulation.

Following senior Quinn Schreck's faceoff win, Oakwood Head Coach

Aaron Hemler called timeout to set up a final play. The rain-soaked crowd was not disappointed as Parker took the ball at inbounds and drove to the net for the tying goal with 32 seconds left in the quarter, setting up Clark's heroics in overtime.

In addition to his three goals, Parker lead the team in ground balls collected with six, followed by Will Morris with four. Ben Hick and Steven Hamblin each collected two, while Schreck, Maynor, Tripp Martindale and Hans Tureck each had one. Stack saved 11 of 18 shots for the win.

Earlier in the week, the Lumberjacks suffered losses to Chaminade Julienne, 10-9, and Franklin, 13-10.


Ben Hick, Petr Markov, Parker and




