We received news of the loss of JIM TALMAN from his daughter, Christine, in March. The following is an excerpt from his obituary. James Barber Talman, a resident of Sewickley, PA, passed away peacefully on March 20, 2020, at the age of 103. He was the son of the late William W. and Ada (Barber) Talman. He is survived by his son, James Talman, Jr. (Jean) of Centennial, CO, and daughter Christine (Howard Cohen) of Sewickley. Jim was born in Indian Village, Detroit, on August 10, 1916. He and his brothers, William and Thomas, attended Cranbrook School in Bloomfield Hills. He always said that the most lasting result of his education there was being a gentleman. In 2012 he attended the first 80th class reunion ever held at Cranbrook with one other surviving classmate. Jim had an early passion for flight. He got his pilot's license and acquired his first airplane, a 40-hp Aeronca, while in college. In 1939, he graduated from the University of Michigan, where he was affiliated with the Sigma Phi fraternity and slept in the same room his father had occupied. Jim earned a degree in aeronautical engineering and immediately began work at North American Aviation in Los Angeles designing and testing the B-25 bomber. He married Margaret Harris Jones, a fellow employee, in 1944. After WWII he designed and built airplane hangars for private planes. The family subsequently moved to Palm Springs, California, where he began a career in resort management. He ran Smoke Tree Ranch in the winters and Chevy Chase Inn in Port Townsend, Washington, in the summers. This gave him ample time to maintain his status as a scratch golfer and to pursue his love of tennis. After retirement Jim lived in Canyon Country, CA, and founded the Newhall Tennis Club on his home court where he spent time teaching many children in the area to play. In later years the focus of his life was playing in senior tennis tournaments, including the national clay court, grass court, indoor and hard court championships on the east and west coasts. He drove an RV, initially from his home in Southern California, to these tournaments until he was 93, with a one-year hiatus to have both knees replaced. At the age of 92 he was nationally ranked fourth in singles and seventh in doubles in his age division. After his wife Peggy's death, Jim moved to Sewickley to be near his daughter. He joined the Allegheny Country Club and informed new friends and staff of his determination to live to 100. His favorite activity during these years was acting as a volunteer coach for the Sewickley Academy girls' tennis team. He attended every practice and tournament for five years, including driving to Hershey to support the team when they won the state championship. He showed by example that tennis is a game for life. Jim was famous for his warmth, patience, optimism and even temper. A hug was his favorite form of communication. He made a point of visiting his loving network of children, grandchildren Cameron (Lisa Wise) of Washington DC, Matthew (Margo Szczygielski) of Brooklyn, NY and Victoria (Ben Owens) of Greenwood Village, CO, as well as great grandchildren, cousins, nieces and nephews and their children. A memorial will be held at a future time. She attended Bradford Junior College in Massachusetts, and was a member of Delta Gamma Sorority at the University of Michigan from where she graduated with a Masters Degree in Early Childhood Education. As a nursery school and Sunday school teacher, she would later become the Director of Echo Park School. She sat on the State of Michigan Education Board, and also earned her brokers license selling real estate for many years. Her love of teaching and reading is a treasured memory of each of her many grandchildren. In May of 1949, Nancy married Richard Charles Kern '37 of Bloomfield Hills, and Vice President of the Kern Department Store in Detroit, where the Kern Clock still stands. Together, they raised their family in Franklin, Michigan on the Franklin River. She was active in her community being President of the Board of Trustees of Detroit Orthopedic Clinic through Sigma Gamma, and of the National Society of Colonial Dames-Michigan. Nancy loved singing in the choirs of The Junior League of Birmingham, Michigan and Christ Church Cranbrook. She sang in the church choir for some 70 years. She enjoyed snow skiing, winning a Grandmother's Race at Otsego Ski Club; tennis, a beauty of the fashion; and was a devoted golfer at Orchard Lake County Club. She was also an avid gardener and a lifelong member of the Franklin Garden Club.

Our class author and renowned novelist, **WARD JUST** regrettably will not write anymore books. The final page of Ward's exemplary life was turned last December when he succumbed to Lewy body dementia and died at the age of 84.

Coming from a journalistic family—he was the son and grandson of newspaper publishers—and with the same initials (WSJ) as one of America's great papers, Ward was destined

to become a writer. And, he honed his writing skills in various English classes at Cranbrook; he always gave full credit for his success to his Cranbrook English teachers. Many times, Ward returned to speak with aspiring students; in 1998, he was the speaker at the Kris Sirchio '83 lecture series, and we-I dubbed our group "Ward and the Justianians"—got together to hear many tales and adventures from our famous classmate. Ward was honored as the Distinguished Alumnus in 1970, the first of two in our class to be recognized (BUD MOORE in 2000 is the other). To show his appreciation of all that Cranbrook did for him, Ward contributed many of his manuscripts and works to the School's Archives in 1990. He continued to do so from 1998 to 2005, and now his widow, Sarah, has been working with Greg Wittkopp, Archives Director, to send the remainder of Ward's literary efforts to Cranbrook, thus completing the "Ward Swift Just Papers" collection. Ward's death was noted in the New York Times with a large, six-column-wide obituary, headlined: "Ward Just, an Ex-Journalist Who Found Larger Truths in Fiction, Dies at 84." A quote from the article: "His spare and graceful prose in a score of novels and numerous short stories was compared to Ernest Hemingway's, while his perceptions about American society reminded some critics of Henry James." Ward authored 18 novels with the last one coming in 2014. He was an active war correspondent in Vietnam from 1965 to '67. Injured in 1966, from a north Vietnamese grenade, he returned to covering the war after a brief hospital stay. His memorable time there led him to write his first book in 1968, "To What End: Report from Vietnam." He was one of the first writers to question our presence there, and he was highly critical of our politicians and generals, especially Gen. William Westmoreland. After starting his writing career in 1957 by working as a reporter at his family's newspaper, the Waukegan News-Sun, he was hired in 1965 by the famous editor, Ben Bradlee, to become the Washington Post's man in Vietnam. Here are some messages between the two, speaking in the unique style of cables: From Ben-"Downkeep head, upkeep copy." From Ward—"While downkeeping head infell large pothole. Can I buy cane on expense account?" and from Ben-"Okay one cane but suggest downkeeping eyes while downkeeping head outwatching potholes."

While at Cranbrook for two years, Ward was on the staff for both the Crane and Brook and served as committee chairman of what was quaintly then the Smoking Room. Bill Salot '52, Crane editor our junior year, maintains that he started Ward on his writing career when he hired him to work at the School's paper.

In the 1953 Brook, Ward's informal photo (the genius idea of yearbook editor PHIL LEMESSURIER) has him banging away at a typewriter, a cigarette dangling from his mouth with the comic caption: "The Old Man And The Sea," huh! Ward was married three times and he had three children, daughters Julie and Jennifer, and a son, Ian. His literary muses led him to his writing sanctuary, at Vineyard Haven, on Martha's Vineyard in Massachusetts. It was from there that over these many years I received several letters from him (typewritten of course—he had a collection of manual typewriters which he used because he said he didn't want to take time off from writing to master the computer). My WSJ file is full and now complete, but the wonderful and joyful memories will live on. RIP, WSJ. MORE BERRIES IN FLORIDA: Not the citrus kind, but Kathie and CHARLIE **BERRY** made the southward journey in January. After more than 30 years in Connecticut, where their long-time neighbor was Katharine Hepburn, they have moved to Florida. Temporarily in Ponte Vedra on the east coast south of Jacksonville, they planned to look for a permanent home in the area. But before they left, the enterprising and energetic couple crossed an item off their Bucket List—they went back to college! Our parents transferred us together in 6th grade from the Detroit school system to Brookside. Afraid to be late-comers, Jon and I thought we would not be warmly welcomed by our peers. But when baseball season started, Jon as a great pitcher and me as his longtime catcher, we were treated as big time stars. Jon was indeed a huge Tigers fan and never missed listening to a radio broadcast of a game. We would be playing whiffle ball in my backyard and as soon as Jon remembered that it was game time he (purposely) fell down screaming "oh, the pain, the agony!" and hobbled home to hear the play-by-play action. This ruse went on for years, and I remember it in detail to this day, 70 years later. The other story I remember occurred when he was in his psychiatric residency. His supervisor was not happy that Jon preferred not to wear shoes (loving to go barefoot since childhood) and was about to chastise him big time. However, Jon recently had been put in charge of caring for a very wealthy, demanding authoritative "crazy" patient who nobody else could treat successfully. After a very few sessions, Jon told her, in no uncertain terms and using expletives, that she was a spoiled abusive brat and that there was nothing wrong with her brain. The woman went to Jon's supervisor, told him that Jon was the first person to tell her the truth, and then she wrote the department a significant check in Jon's honor. What a guy! 



Dear Classmates, It's with great sadness that I report of the passing of our classmate, **JIM PRUNESKI**, on December 24, 2019.

Summarized from his obituary: Jim fought a valiant battle against cancer for over 6 years to reach his two most important milestones his son, James Andrew's, graduation from West Point in May 2019 and his daughter, Alexandra Nicole's, graduation from the University of Alabama on December 16, 2019. Jim was born in Mt. Clemens, MI. He and his brother, Chris '85, spent part of their teenaged years in Europe. After graduating from Cranbrook he went on to West Point and was assigned to Ft. Hood where he met Sandy Barton. They were married in December 1990 and had their twins, James and Alex, in Melbourne where Jim was teaching at the Australian Signal School. Jim also spent 17 years in Signal Corps assignments in Texas, Florida, Kansas, North Carolina, New Mexico, and the Pentagon. He was promoted to Colonel. He held several high positions in his 30 years of military service, including Director of Combat Development, US Army Space and Missile Defense Command; Chief Operations Officer for Space at the US Army Central Command; Deputy Director, Future Warfare Center, US Army Space and Missile Defense Command: and Missile Defense Command's Chief Information Officer. His final post before retirement was as Director of Capability Development and Integration. He received many awards, including two Legions of Merit, the Defense Meritorious Service Award, five Meritorious Service Medals, the Army Staff Identification Badge, and the Basic Air Force Space and Mission, Master Space and Senior Space Badges. In June 2019, Jim returned to the US Army Space and Mission Defense Command as a civil service employee, where he served as the Director, Space and Strategic Systems in the Technical Center until he passed away. Jim is survived by his wife of 29 years, Sandy, his twin children, James and Alex, parents James and Lydia Pruneski, and his brother Chris and his wife, Angela. Donations can be made to West Point Electrical Engineering/Pre-Medical Internships at www.westpointagg. org in memory of COL James D. Pruneski. I spoke with Jim's brother, Chris '85, as well. He writes, "I just spent a very pleasant half hour on the phone with Arash. We discussed how interesting it is to look at trajectories and arcs that people follow through their lives. Standing where I am now, I tell you truly that I could never have predicted the path that I have been on. I am very thankful that Arash is allowing me a few words in the C84 Tradition class notes. The occasion for Arash and I talking came about because of my brother's death this past Christmas Eve. Jim's life path has been exceptional and probably not well known to even a few outside the company of his wife, our parents, and myself. Jim was ever disciplined, well informed, calm and thoughtful. These qualities carried through into everything he did. I have met highly technical peers who were thankful to be challenged by Jim to perform better and subordinates who didn't just feel but knew that Jim was working with them for success in their lives. Jim used his gifts to make a difference. Jim was only at Cranbrook for one year (it was our third high school) but that was a very important year in cementing the qualities which would carry through in his life. The challenges provided at Cranbrook and the friends with whom he was able to interact fed his understanding of purpose. Although I don't think he remained in contact with many people from C84, I believe that Jim carried those experiences and used them on a daily basis—"As iron sharpens iron" I believe the phrase is. Thank you all for that. Arash wondered if I might share a memory from Cranbrook. There are many, many since we were boarding and Cranbrook and our friends were most of our lives at that point. Here is a vignette of the night that someone moved the life-sized Stegosaurus from the Institute of Science to the Quad for a drink from the water fountain. The event was originally to have occurred the night before but there were first responders at the Institute of Science for an alarm. It was a narrow escape but I believe the nuts holding the dinosaur down were removed. The following night maybe as many as 20 boarders darted between the trees, covering the half mile very quickly. The return trip was not quite as fast nor protected since the dinosaur was life-size and had to be carried down the middle of the road. There was also a slight problem negotiating the triple arches next to Stevens Hall and the Stegosaurus' back fins might have scraped the top of the arch. No idea how Stevens Dorm Housemaster (Mr. Firke?) didn't show up because he was especially adept at catching wayward boarders. The dinosaur was left to have a drink from the fountain and roam the quad."



He will be remembered with great fondness by Brooksiders and their families. We are sad to report that former staff member **MARGOT SNYDER** passed away at the age of 95. She was the wife of the late Cranbrook faculty member and founder of Horizons-Upward Bound at Cranbrook Schools, the late Ben M. Snyder III.

Here are some reflections from her family upon her passing. Her life story is simultaneously tragic and inspirational. Her amazing life as "the daughter of a Jewish father and Christian mother born in Berlin as Hitler was coming to power, she experienced discrimination, fear and confusion in her formative years before the family fled in late 1938 to The Hague in The Netherlands. As Holocaust refugees, they lived a very tenuous existence—always short on food, with our mom being the only person allowed to leave their home, perpetually nervous about what their fate might be (and surviving some very close calls during the Nazi occupation). After the war, she received two degrees in art history (inspired by the four-generation art dealing family business) from the University of Leiden. In 1950, she gave a tour of the campus to a tall, single American who had just started teaching at Cranbrook School in Michigan following his service as an air force bombardier in the South Pacific during World War II. Our mom used her degrees to become the curator of galleries at the Cranbrook Academy of Art in 1955. The courage and faith that it must have taken to move to the states before the two of them were engaged was a signal of her strength and her determination to find love. They ultimately were married in the Hague in 1956, and the three of us soon followed. The personal and professional lives of our parents were deeply intertwined. Our dad's role at Cranbrook was demanding. When he founded Horizons Upward Bound in 1965, the two of them embarked on a lifelong journey to open up Cranbrook's doors to the world and provide educational opportunities to those from the most under-resourced communities in Detroit and Pontiac. Together, they embodied the ideals of the civil rights movement with our mom providing the support both at home and at school without which HUB would not have flourished and evolved to serve thousands of young people over the last fifty-four years. While our dad got much of the credit, anyone close to the family knew that it was our mom who helped turn our father's vision into practical realities. She warmly welcomed and nourished so many along the way with special attention, love and support paid to our "brother from another mother," Darryl Taylor (the current Director of HUB), and our cousin Pauline from Holland. Throughout, she was the leader of regular adventures to visit family in Holland, the visionary who helped transform an old barn in rural Pennsylvania into a home of tremendous warmth, a practitioner of yoga "before it was fashionable," and a walker who treasured "frische luft"(fresh air in German) until just days before her passing. Margot will be remembered at the Gathering of Golden Graduates at reunion on Saturday June 6 4-5pm in Page Hall. She and Ben will always be remembered with much love and affection by scores of former students and colleagues, so many of whom became lifelong friends.


