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
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
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f you're LGBTQ and new to Tampa, everything you need to know about this city, circa 2019, can be summed up in this vignette:

The newly elected lesbian mayor, Jane Castor, and her partner, Ana Cruz, posing for a photo and a kiss in a very public outdoor setting — and not a discouraging word or muttered epithet is heard from passersby, only "Congratulations!" and "I voted for you!" and "We love you, Jane!"

When Mayor Castor was elected in April 2019 by a whopping 73% over David Straz, a retired banker who outspent her by millions, the national and international press took notice. First out lesbian mayor of a major Southeastern city! Winning in a landslide! In Hillsborough County, of all places, where in 2005 a commissioner had successfully spearheaded a county ban on gay pride celebrations — "little g, little p," as the commissioner made a point of emphasizing.

So the world wanted to know: How did Jane Castor win? Did she have to combat veiled homophobia? Anti-gay mailers? "Family values" sermons?

The answer: None of the above. Because Jane Castor, and Tampa, had already crossed that rubicon. She'd been appointed the city's first female and first openly gay police chief in 2009 after 25 years on the force, and voters had come to like and respect her. She was Jane, and Jane was cool.

Still is cool. And her city right now is also cool, cooler than it's ever been, and not just because it elected a gay mayor. Truth be told, despite that gay pride "ban" (which was lifted through the leadership of the city's first openly gay county

commissioner, Kevin Beckner, in 2013), Tampa has been hospitable to gays for many years. The Tampa International Gay & Lesbian Film Festival is celebrating its 30th anniversay; the GaYbor Coalition supports gay-friendly businesses in the city's colorful historic district; and the Tampa Pride Parade, revived in 2015, is getting to be as big as the one across the bay in St. Petersburg, which throws the biggest Pride celebration in Florida.

But in addition to being a city with an active LGBTQ community (or maybe because of that?), Tampa is, simply, having a moment. Downtown has never been more vibrant. In Seminole Heights, a once desolate stretch of used car dealerships has become a hip arts and dining district. Tampa Heights is coming into its own, too, and the major entertainment districts,

Hyde Park/SoHo and Ybor, are as vital as ever.

So where should a Tampa newbie begin? I asked Mayor Castor that question during our interview (p. 8) and she replied, without having to think very long, "The Riverwalk!" That was the site of our mayoral photo shoot: a 2.6-mile pedestrian path with access to parks and restaurants and museums along the way, not to mention stellar views of the river and the city — the University of Tampa minarets to the west, the ever-changing skyline to the east. You'll find a crosssection of Tampanians enjoying this waterfront amenity, which has been decades in the making - just one of the factors opening minds and hearts to the idea that Tampa is a pretty extraordinary place to be.

Start at the Riverwalk. Tell them Mayor Jane sent you.

ane Castor's backstory was already well-known when she was named police chief in 2009: born and raised in Tampa, worked in her family's cabinet businesss, graduated from Chamberlain High, won an athletic scholarship to the University of Tampa, joined the police force at 24. We knew about her relationship with St. Pete Assistant Police Chief Melanie Bevan (now police chief in Bradenton) and about the two sons they adopted, and we knew that she and Bevan had split up. We even knew Castor's height (6 feet) and her shoe size (11). Now, at the age of 59, her high-profile win means the world knows her, too — including people like Democratic presidential candidates Cory Booker, Elizabeth Warren and Pete Buttigieg, all of whom called to congratulate her.

Her current partner of 11 years, Ana Cruz, 46, is also a familiar figure, particularly in Florida political circles. Like Castor she's a Tampa native, and hails from a strong and supportive family (her mother, Janet Cruz, is a Democratic state senator). She's worked on multiple campaigns (including Hillary Clinton's, for which she was Florida spokesperson), she makes frequent TV appearances as a political analyst, and she is managing partner of a powerful Tampa lobbying firm, Ballard Partners. A key figure in the Castor campaign, she assembled what she calls a "foxhole team" to advise the candidate.

In short, the ultimate power couple.

So, during an interview in City Hall shortly after Castor's inauguration, I asked the power couple the ultimate question:

How'd you two meet?

"I arrested Ana," Castor replied. "So that was the beginning."

Which is not true, but quintessential Jane: She's a master of the deadpan wisecrack.

The actual details: She was

running the intelligence bureau for the police department in 2000, with responsibilities that included "dignitary protection." It being an election year, "Gore and Bush were here on a regular basis," she recalls, and Cruz was working on the Gore campaign. "So I kept seeing Ana walking around with this clipboard, large and in charge, ordering everybody around. We would have conversations, mostly about logistics, because she was on the political side and I was on the security side."

"The Secret Service would always tell the campaign, 'No, you can't do this!' said Cruz, "and so the campaign would have to push back and say, 'Yes, we have to do this!"

"She'll say that the campaign won," said Castor, "and I'll say that the Secret Service always won."

"Not with *me*, baby!" countered Cruz.

For years they were no more than passing acquaintances, until

one evening in late 2007 when they ran into each other at a Halcyon concert at Skipper's Smokehouse, the iconic Tampa music

Who made the first move?

"Ana!" declared Castor as if the answer were self-evident, and they both exploded in laughter. "I mean, please! I think she gave me a direct order to call her."

They started dating on and off the following year, and now share a house in Seminole Heights with a dock and a boat (they both like to fish) and three dogs. Jane's two sons — Sergei and Seely, both turning 20 this year — are an integral part of the couple's lives, splitting time between the Bevan and Castor households and very visible on the mayoral campaign trail.

Ana is, according to Castor, an "amazing" cook (her spinach bread is the stuff of legend); Jane is a self-described "en masse cooker," specializing in big batches. ("I have a kickass chili

recipe, and I make vats of it.") Both are nevertheless rail thin — the benefits of morning workouts and non-stop campaigning — with markedly different but complementary style profiles.

Our photo shoot called for "business casual." which Castor interpreted as a dark tailored pantsuit, Cruz as a tight-fitting sheath and Louboutins.

There was a monogrammed makeup kit in the mayor's car, a Christmas gift

from Janet Cruz. Castor likes it but says it's "way too big. I've got about three things of makeup. You know, there's not much to this girl."

Castor easily handled the congrats and waves of passersby that day, but her partner says that the new mayor is shy. She didn't fully realize how shy till close to the end of Castor's tenure as police chief, when Ana encouraged her to walk and hand out beads during the annual Christmas parade instead of riding in her car as she usually did.

"I just noticed it was hard for her," remembers Cruz. "We got home and I said, 'You're shy.' And she said, 'Hello? Where have you been?"

Castor admits that living in the public eye can be a trial. "I can't go to Home Depot to buy parts for the sprinkler system, even in sunglasses and a baseball cap." But she respected the fact that as police chief "the community feels as if they own you, and they do, to a degree. So it's never really bothered me."

Shopping trips should prove even more challenging now that she's mayor. But part of Castor's appeal may be her shyness — the sense that she's not putting on a mask or glad-handing you.

"She has this calmness about her," says Cruz. "I call her my gentle giant. I've seen her in some of the toughest times, and she is an absolute rock."

— when she had to tell the wives of two young police officers, David Curtis and Jeffrey Kocab, that their husbands had been killed in the line of duty. Castor's quiet strength — and her determination to find the perpe-

trators — is part of the city's collective memory.

So when she's asked, as she inevitably is, about the firsts she represents, particularly being the first out lesbian mayor of Tampa, she respects the significance and what it may say about Tampa, but allows that it wasn't just any gay politician who won, it was Jane Castor, a woman the city had come to know. "Everybody's had 31 years to test-drive me — that makes it a little more difficult to discriminate when you know an individual personally, you know their character."

One of Castor's most famous deadpan remarks was her response to Times columnist Sue Carlton in 2015, who asked her right before she retired about rumors that Castor might run for mayor. Her response: "It just makes me realize the drug problem in this city is much more dire than I anticipated." Nevertheless, after a year or two she began having conversations about a mayoral run with her family, and with the two mayors she'd worked for, Pam Iorio and Bob Buckhorn.

Finally, she says, her decision came down to the fact that "the city's going to change so much in the next decade." To be a part of that "was an incredible opportunity that I couldn't pass up."

For Cruz, the answer was always clear. "It wasn't difficult for me," says Cruz, "because I know she can do it and I knew I could do it. This is not about a title for her — this is about the city that she loves."

And a city that, for now at least, loves her back.

"My favorite part of the swearing-in was looking out in the room," recalls Cruz about the mayor's inauguration. "People were so incredibly happy — and in politics lately people haven't felt that way. It was so refreshing, and kind of restored my faith in the political process."

It may help to do the same for


voters across the country — particularly if they're gay.

When I asked Mayor Castor why an LGBTQ person should visit or move here, she first gave the politician's standard answer: "Because it's the greatest city in the nation!"

But more to the point, she added, "One comment that I hear more than anything is how friendly this city is, and how accepting we are of everyone. I don't know if you could boil a city's reputation down to one sentence that would be better than that."

hen Michael Tomor first interviewed to be the Tampa Museum of Art's executive director in 2015. he didn't know much about the institution or the city. He'd been director of the El Paso Museum of Art in Texas since 2006. following a stint as director of the Southern Alleghenies Museum of Art in Pennsylvania, and wasn't really desperate for a job. But once he met the members of TMA's search committee led by Penny Vinik, he was sold.

"I thought, you know what? If these people are reflective of the people who support this institution. I wanna work for them."

When the committee asked for his CV, he added a paragraph that was personal, making sure they knew that if he were to get the job, he'd be moving to Tampa with his husband. Tom Trexler. a computer programmer. No problem for the committee; when they brought Tomor in for his second interview, they invited Trexler to come to town.

Tomor, 56, has been out since he took his first job in 1994 as chief curator at the Southern Alleghenies museum, where he worked after getting a doctorate from Penn State with a specialty in Ba-

roque art. He believes that being out is a professional necessity. "I'm in a position of trust," he says, "and if people feel that they don't know you because you're not being 100 percent forthright, it will affect the way that they work with you."

He has already made progress in fulfilling the goals set for him by the TMA board, which included expanding the museum's education programs, community

> outreach and collections, with a recent coup being the donor purchase of the stunning "Laura with Bun" by the Spanish sculptor Jaume Plensa. In 2020 the museum will celebrate its 100th birthday.

But no matter the challenge, Tomor exudes a diplomatic calm.

He and his husband have come to love Tampa. Together 33 years (they married in 2013 as soon as DOMA was repealed), they live in


the Ballast Point neighborhood with their 11-year-old schnauzer/ terrier mix Petey, and appreciate the fact that so much of what they need is within easy driving distance — including Tampa International Airport. ("I love this airport!" says Michael.) While they enjoy restaurants like Donatello, Mise en Place and Nueva Cantina, they don't dine out often because Tom's a great cook (he's a big fan of Ina Garten).

Fortunately, given the Florida climate. Michael is a self-described "warm weather guy." His plants like the heat, too. An avid gardener, he'd always grown tropicals but had to keep them in a greenhouse or an atrium before; now he can grow his orchids outdoors.

She teaches full-time at St. Petersburg College, where her classes include creative writing, fiction, African American literature, and composition. She has had two novels published, self-published a short story collection, created a student writing guide, and her essays and short stories can be found in various

Along with teaching and writing, Sheree founded Kitchen Table Literary Arts, which works closely with the Dr. Carter G. Woodson African American History Museum in St. Pete, and the literary organizations Wordier Than Thou and Keep St. Pete Lit. She's also regularly involved with

print anthologies, literary jour-

nals, online magazines and blogs.

local orgs like Project No Labels, the Black Market Collective. Heard 'Em Say Teen Arts Collective, Art2Action, The Speak Tank and more.

"I used to run the only LGBTQ open mic in the area, Oral Fixation, which was sponsored by

Nora Gupton and her GrownGurlz organization, which primarily served black lesbian and bisexual women, but opened the door to a larger commu-

nity of black queer individuals across all genders and sexualities," Sheree said. "We frequently partnered with community organizations across identities, such as supply and food drives for The Spring of Tampa Bay and open mic collaborations at the Community

Cafe and The Poets@USF. Being a host and organizer for that showed me there was a need for creating and holding space for LGBTQ people of color, who are sometimes marginalized in many LGBTQ events and initiatives.

"I make it my business to show

up as my whole self, every time, so that every thing I do advances, even in sometimes small ways, our broader LGBTQ community."

Sheree lives with her wife, Jasmine Smith. The two have been together for nine years and will celebrate their second wedding anniversary in July 2019. They hope to have an addition to their family soon. "We have a dog named Knight, who is

going to be both delighted and irritated to have a human baby around."

Sheree loves Tampa Bay because of the endless options. "There is always something to do. I am fortunate to know a lot of really cool people who do really amazing events: Christina Arenas does vegan food festivals and chakra workshops at Blue Sage Eco Boutique, London James hosts paint and sip parties featuring my favorite hiphop, reggae, and R&B artists; Rah at Lector Wine and Social Club hosts really dope events.

"Then there's just being outside for a meal or conversation at a local restaurant or bar," she adds. "It's just always something to do and people to meet. I love it."

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uke Blankenship, 25, helms the organization that puts together the state's largest LGBTQ Pride celebration, St. Pete Pride. He serves as executive director and has been involved with the organization for the last five years. "I handle the day-to-day operations, which include sponsorship sales, event planning and volunteer development," he says. "I started as a general volunteer and worked my way through every facet of the organization."

He lives in North St. Petersburg, giving him access to the best of both worlds, downtown St. Pete and Tampa. He has been in the Tampa Bay area for 20 years and counting — he grew up in Lutz, just outside of Tampa. "It's a quaint place and very family-focused," he says. "It's grown so much in the last 20 years! Also, it's pronounced 'loots.' If you pronounce it like the pretzel brand Utz to a local, you will be laughed at!"

Besides St. Pete Pride, Luke is involved with the Tampa Bay Diversity Chamber of Commerce,

St. Petersburg Chamber of Commerce and InterPride, to name a few. "Every day I talk

about putting on Florida's largest Pride — many discussions on how we can make our world-class events better and better with a variety of people and organizations," Luke says. "I'm a friendly acquaintance with hundreds of organizations throughout the area. Usually, when I'm meeting with company representatives, they break away from their standard 9 a.m.-5 p.m. day jobs to talk about our colorful parade."

When he's not slaving away for the greater good of Tampa Bay's LGBTQ community, he finds fun in the usual activities other 20somethings do, like

> going out to local bars and clubs. "I'm a bit of a nerd. as I'm very much into

fantasy football and following what's going on in the sports world," he says. "I am in a Dynasty Fantasy Football league that mimics the NFL, and it's a nice reprieve from daily life heading into year six with the same group of folks. I also dabble in podcasting and am always

looking for the next great RPG to plug into my Xbox."

So why does the exec director of Florida's largest Pride organization think others will love Tampa Bay?

"Unlike so many places across the country, we are growing. Heck, we aren't just growing, we are exploding!" Luke says. "Something that is sometimes talked about as a negative, but really isn't, is how many people weren't raised here. It provides a variety of different backgrounds and creative ideas. The cost of living isn't absurd, and we are a top 15 media market with a small-town feel."

"Not to mention," he adds pragmatically, "no state or personal income tax."

avid Johnson is an associate professor of history at the University of South Florida, which he calls "the greatest job in the world." But back in the mid-1950s, he would have been booted off the job. The same fate would have awaited him if he'd worked for the U.S. State Department, even up through the 1970s.

Why? Because he's gay. In his 2004 book, The Lavender Scare (basis for the acclaimed 2017 documentary), Johnson examined the Cold War paranoia that spawned witch hunts for gays and lesbians in federal employ. Similar anti-gay campaigns took place on the academic front; Johnson says that his graduate students have been exploring the shameful legacy of the Florida Legislature's Johns Committee, which tried

to root out gay teachers from Florida schools. "One Florida legislator at the time," says Johnson, "called USF 'a veritable refuge for practicing homosexuals."

Well, practice makes perfect. Johnson says that the USF of 2019 has been "very supportive

of me and my he adds, "being at a public university in a purple state means I do get the occa-

sional piece of hate mail accusing me of teaching 'moral depravity,' particularly recently, as such views have been emboldened.")

His newest book, Buying Gay, explores the proliferation of socalled "physique" magazines in the 1950s and '60s and the role they played in gay liberation. He and his students have also uncovered what they believe to have been the first act of collective LGBT civil disobedience in the city's history, aka "Tampa's Stonewall" — a sit-in protest organized by the Metropolitan Community Church in 1972

against a downwork." (Although, **Tampa is "vibrant**, town Denny's that refused to serve members affordable," says of the community. A longtime supporter of

Equality Florida and the Tampa Bay International Gay & Lesbian Film Festival, he helped launch a project to preserve both organizations' records and memorabilia in the LGBT Collections at the USF Libraries.

History informs his private as well as his professional life. A New Hampshire native and Georgetown grad with a Ph.D. from Northwestern, he lives in a renovated bungalow in the Seminole Heights neighborhood and loves the fact that Tampa has "a lot of historic architecture — especially compared to other cities in Florida." His partner of three years, Tommy Voravong, has a family catering business specializing in Laotian and Thai food; the couple's explorations around town often involve trying out "all the new restaurants, food halls, and craft cocktail bars that have been springing up like weeds."

What would he tell LGBTQ folks considering a move to Tampa? "I would tell them to come here. It's vibrant, diverse, and affordable. And it is in a purple state like Floridawhere the struggle continues." —David Warner

arissa Pepe, 27, is one of those rare individuals who grew up in the Tampa Bay area. "I grew up in Tarpon Springs with my perfect mom, dad and sisters after they migrated from New York, moved to St. Pete for college nine years ago, and haven't left since."

She currently lives in downtown St. Pete with her wife, Bryce Anne, and works for Burton Holdings Restaurant Group in downtown Tampa. "I develop, design and run operations for a slew of restaurants in downtown. My current projects include Gen X Tavern, Flock & Stock inside Sparkman Wharf and Tampa Pizza Company. I've had the

pleasure of working alongside Dave Burton for almost 10 years and it's been a wild ride." She is proud to have spoken on panels at Tampa Bay Startup Week and the

restaurant group's partnerships with local organizations like Tampa Connec-

tion, Glazer Children's Museum and Pride & Passion.

She's a doggy stepmom to Big and Trixie (who combined, she notes, weigh 12 lbs.), and considers herself lucky to be acknowledged by them. When she's not at work she says she loves 24-to-48-hour trips. camping with her wife at Fort De Soto, rock climbing, cooking

and drinking adult beverages at Room 901, Buya Ramen and Intermezzo.

Of her involvement in Tampa's LGBTQ community, she talks

about her experience speaking on a panel at the University of South Florida

about the coming-out process, gender identity and human sexuality. "For over nine years, I have led the discussion with varied guest speakers to help better educate, share a new viewpoint and encourage tolerance both on college campuses and in the community. I started the GSA in my high school in 2009, and when I got to USF I knew that I needed to be part of something more. The experience has led me to beautiful friendships, moments of selfrealization and allowed me to touch the lives of thousands of people over the years."

As for why she chooses Tampa Bay, there are many reasons. "It's got great weather, a booming economy and it still manages to keep its own smalltown identity while growing into something larger. We're blessed with forward-thinking people, a great bar and restaurant scene and easy access to so many other great towns around us, too."

t seems safe to say that Preston Scott, 37, is the only bank executive in Tampa Bay whose resume includes "regional professional makeup artist."

But it's not as big a leap as it might seem. As Preston told an interviewer from Wells Fargo in Sarasota, where he began his banking career after jobs with Dillard's and Lancome, "If I can sell a \$300 face cream to someone, I can sell a checking account."

His self-confidence has always helped him stand out. Not that it was hard to stand out in Keokuk, Iowa, a "small white town," he says, "where the 10 black people in my school were my cousins."

But being bi-racial didn't pose a problem; coming out as gay did. He was 19 and going to Bible college, and after he told a counselor he thought he might be attracted to men, he was subjected to conversion therapy and mandatory prayer in the company of an "accountability partner" (who, fortuitously enough, was "the hottest guy on campus").

He left college before he could be expelled and got a job at Dil-

lard's, eventually becoming one of the agers of a cosmetic counter in lowa. "I had never put makeup on anybody before, but I have

three sisters, so I'd been around a lot of it."

In 2007, needing a fresh start after a breakup, he moved to Orlando, where he landed department store jobs and a husband. The couple made several moves around Florida, and along the way Preston was hired by Lancome to be a roving ambassador for the brand. When the travel began to weary him, he leapt at the opportunity to apply to Wells Fargo. From there he moved to C1 Bank, whose CEO, Trevor Burgess, was an inspiration: "When Trevor came out as the first openly gay CEO of a pub-

licly traded bank in the U.S., it was a only two male man- segment of the big deal." Preston went from percommunity sonal banker to vice has a place president at C1 (now Bank OZK) in four and a half years.

> Two years ago he moved to Pilot Bank to work with its president, Rita Lowman, a former colleague from C1. He is now the bank's vice president and marketing director. And somewhere in the midst of all these changes, he got a degree in psychology from USF (the first in his immediate family to get a BA), and he is finishing a Juris Master's in financial regulation

and compliance through FSU.

Diversity is an ongoing concern for him. He sees few black or bi-racial leaders at national banking conferences, and he's disappointed both in African-American gay men who feel they have to live "on the downlow" and in the anti-black biases in LGBT online dating ads. But overall he sees Tampa Bay as a tremendously "embracing" place for its LGBTQ residents. "Every segment of the community has a place here."

He describes himself now as "very single." (He and his husband divorced amicably a little more than a year ago.) He lives in the Westshore district of Tampa, and loves eating at Armature Works and Miguelito's, patronizing the gay businesses in Ybor — and "just enjoying this beautiful city as much as I can."

ustice Gennari works and lives in Tampa's gayborhood, Ybor City. He was born in Sandusky, Ohio, but raised in Tampa. "[I have lived here] almost 20 years total, as I was raised here and moved back here three years ago from Aspen, Colorado."

Now going on his second year as president of the Tampa Bay Diversity Chamber of Commerce, Justice works with many of the movers and shakers in Tampa Bay's LGBTQ community to make positive things happen. He is also plugged into the community as an Equality Means Business Advisory Board member with Equality Florida, on the Pride &



evin Beckner—the first openly gay elected official in Hillsborough County stated, "We've torn barriers down and we've become known as a welcoming destination for the LGBTQ community."

As we write, the amazing Tampa Bay Rays baseball's little-engine-that-could — are battling the Yankees for first place in the game's toughest division, and the rollickin' Rowdies. have maintained the top slot in the United Soccer League conference for weeks. The Bucs — well, the Bucs won a Super Bowl once, so there's that.

And who knows what will happen

next? That's the beauty of it all. (And oh, by the way, if your main reason for going to games is the beauty of the players, not the game — we're lookin' at you, Kevin Kiermaier fans — don't worry, we won't judge.)

PLAYING FOR PRIDE

By the way, every one of these teams hosts Pride events to cater to their LGBTQ fan base, and those games are often among the most well-attended of the season. The Rays in particular have been vocal supporters of our community; in the wake of the Pulse nightclub attacks in Orlando in 2016, the team turned its Pride Night into a fundraiser and a memorial, raising more than \$300,000 for the Pulse Victim Fund through ticket sales, raffles and donation centers. The Lightning's Community Hero program, founded in 2011 by team owner Jeff Vinik, has honored hundreds of



"grassroots heroes" with \$50,000 grants, including such LGBTQ leaders as Equality Florida's Nadine Smith and The Studio@620's Bob Devin Jones. The Bucs hired their first openly gay male cheerleader this year, and Ralph's Mob Charities, the fan group of the Rowdies, has announced a 2019 Prideraiser for the benefit of Metro Inclusive Health via ticket sales, donations and a a fetching Rowdy and Proud scarf in the team's yellow and green plus the colors of the rainbow.

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TAKE A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE

Tampa Bay has some of Florida's best urban adventures, but it's also home to amazing outdoor experiences just minutes from downtown's glittering towers. Paddling, bird-watching, animal interactions — they're all waiting for you to discover when you unlock Tampa Bay.

A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT

Slip silently through ancient cypress forests on a **Canoe Escape** along the wild upper reaches of the Hillsborough River. The same river that carries pleasure boats through the heart of downtown is a very different place a few miles upstream. There, in the dappled shade of towering trees, you can get in touch with the true Old Florida. Cast a line for a fish, spot migrating birds flitting among the leafy treetops, snap shots of basking turtles and dozing alligators.

A WALK IN THE WOODS

Explore nature along the paths and boardwalks of major parks just minutes from the excitement of the city. Canoe Florida's only Class 2 rapids at Hillsborough River State Park (a big deal in a place that's pretty flat). Tackle challenging single-track on a mountain bike or in your trail runners at Alafia River State Park, which was built on a reclaimed phosphate mine. Flatwoods Conservation Park is a wild oasis surround by suburbia, with extensive bike and running trails. Lettuce Lake Park offers canoeing along the Hillsborough River as well as a boardwalk and tower for spotting wildlife.

PROTECT THE EARTH

Leave things better than you found them by volunteering some time with one of our many environmental organizations, such as **Keep Tampa Bay Beautiful**, **Tampa Bay Waterkeeper**, or the Tampa Bay chapter of the **Sierra Club**. These and other groups welcome volunteers and regularly organize clean-ups and other project to improve the local environment.

You can also do your own part by making sure litter — especially plastic — goes into the trash instead into the bay. Our beautiful aquatic environment deserves the attention.

MEET THE MANATEES

Maybe your idea of roughing it is room service and a cozy robe. We hear you. You can still get in touch with Mother Nature on your own terms at The Florida Aquarium, ZooTampa at Lowry Park, and Busch Garden Tampa Bay.

- The Florida Aquarium invests in the preservation of sharks and injured sea turtles, as well as breeding coral to replace wild coral disappearing from Florida's coast. You can even support their shark efforts when you order a Sand Tiger Stout by Coppertail Brewing.
- **ZooTampa** has the country's only non-profit hospital to treat injured West Indian manatees and return them to the wild.
- **Busch Gardens Tampa Bay** is a leader in international efforts to preserve threatened and endangered species in the wild.


